Using motion sensors, 3D animation accompanies the three dancers throughout the work, allowing you to see in real time how their movements trace patterns of texture, color and light in the space. In a privileged face-to-face relationship with the artists, you are introduced to the choreography by means of natural, circular movements employed in a short dance sequence. First presented 20 years ago, *The Complex Simplicity of Love* was driven by a desire to dance with someone who was not there, to explore the presence of absence.

Allegro Barbaro dives into the choreography of Hélène Blackburn and puts you onstage near the ten performers of Blackburn's company, Cas Public. The work is inspired by the four humours theory of ancient Greece, whereby any excess or deficit of four bodily fluids (blood, yellow bile, black bile and phlegm) led to sickness. A thrilling dance experience, the piece unfolds at a breathless pace, punctuated by dazzling performers driven to surpass their limits as they relish the sheer joy of dancing.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Agora de la danse

The first permanent venue in Quebec devoted specifically to contemporary dance, Agora de la danse has been at the forefront of new dance creation and presentation for more than 30 years. In addition to offering a public performance venue for dance, Agora also co-produces avant-garde dance projects and provides long-term support for choreographers through different residencies.

Margie Gillis

Gillis is one of the most influential Canadian choreographers/dancers of the 20th and 21st centuries. Her company, the Margie Gillis Dance Foundation, was founded in 1981. Gillis has created more than 150 solo, duet and group works that have been performed around the world. She has received numerous awards in recognition of her invaluable efforts to evolve her art through experimentation, transmission, creation, innovation and performance. Gillis celebrated her 50-year career in 2023: 50 years of creation, love and dance.


Hélène Blackburn and Cas Public

Over the years, Hélène Blackburn's Cas Public has succeeded in establishing itself as a Canadian company with an international reputation. However, the company remains rooted in the cultural reality of Quebec, where it multiplies its efforts to promote contemporary dance to the public and contribute to its development. While continuing to create for the general public, Cas Public has ventured into the field of children's shows since 2001, with *Nous n'irons plus au bois*, a work that has now been performed over 300 times. *Barbe Bleue, Journal Intime, Variations S, 9* and its successor works for young audiences have been presented in festivals and renowned venues around the world, from Chicoutimi to Madrid, including the Opéra Bastille in Paris and the Opéra de Bordeaux.

Andrea Peña & Artists

Andrea Peña & Artists is known for creating critical, alternative and spatial universes that break with our notions and understanding of sentient humanity. Interested in the depth of individuality, a theme that stems from Peña's bi-cultural background, her approach is known for choreographies rich in vulnerability, complexity and somatic physicality, which extend beyond mere movement through conceptual research. With a background in industrial design, her works borrow from visual arts practices and spatial qualities, questioning the body as a material that exists in relation to time and space.

USING THE HEADSET



- ► Adjust headstraps to ensure comfortable headset placement.
- Adjust the distance between the lenses by moving the eye cups directly to a position that provides the clearest image.
- When properly adjusted, the headset should fit comfortably, and you should see a single, clear image.
- ► To select your preferred language and the pieces you wish to view, focus your gaze on the desired option and wait for the loading wheel to complete. If you want to change your selection, look elsewhere before the circle completes.

FOR YOUR SAFETY

- You are encouraged to swivel in your seat but do not stand or walk around while wearing the headset.
- If you need assistance at any time, raise your hand, and a staff member will come to you.
- ▶ Virtual content may include light or patterns that trigger seizures or other symptoms in some (about 1 in 4,000). Immediately stop use and notify a staff member if you experience severe dizziness, seizures, or eye or muscle twitching while using your headset. Use caution if you have previously had a seizure, loss of awareness or other symptoms linked to an epileptic condition.
- Use caution when using the headset in proximity of metal medical devices like hearing aids and pacemakers, as some have reported negative experiences with the magnetic interference.
- ► Do not use the headset if you are under the influence of alcohol or drugs, or if you are experiencing:
 - Upset stomach
 - Fatigue, exhaustion or sleeplessness
 - Emotional stress or anxiety
 - Headache, migraine or earache

You may enjoy this experience for up to one hour after the event's start time. After finishing, we encourage you to get a drink from our lobby bar and gather with fellow attendees to share your thoughts.
