Investigative Theatre Shakes Things Up as the Annenberg Center Presents
The Civilians: In the Footprint: The Battle Over Atlantic Yards

Named Best of 2010 by the *New York Times, Time Out New York* and *The New Yorker*, Now Making its Philadelphia Premiere, **January 18-28, 2012**

(Philadelphia, January 4, 2012) —The Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts' long-lauded tradition of bringing world-renowned theatre companies to Philadelphia audiences takes a new spin this winter, with the Philadelphia premiere of the documusical, *In the Footprint: The Battle Over Atlantic Yards* by The Civilians. In an 11-day performance run from **January 18-28**, **2012**, this piece of investigative theatre heralded by the *The New York Times* as "fresh, inventive and entertaining," is sure to engage and impassion audience members with its relevant and current tale of a development mega-project with a chain-like and oft inadvertent effect on a neighborhood.

Written and directed by Steven Cosson with music and lyrics by Michael Friedman, *In the Footprint* chronicles the largest development project in Brooklyn's history, from the politically-charged debates between developers and residents through to the present-day happenings. Featuring adapted, real-life accounts from major players in the battle, the docu-drama musical addresses issues of race, class, gender, urban planning, community and economics, all with a cutting-edge and tongue-in-cheek disposition. In a flourish of dialogue and music, *In the Footprint* is what *New York Magazine* calls, "social theater at its best."

The Civilians is the center for investigative theatre, supporting the development and production of new theatre from creative inquiries into the most vital questions of the present. The Civilians expands the scope of American theatre and champions innovation by tackling complex and under-explored subjects, enabling artists to enrich their processes through in-depth interaction with their topics, diversifying artistic voices and audiences and integrating theatre with new media. Development often involves community residencies, travel, face-to-face conversations and extensive research. This high degree of engagement with the public continues into production, inviting the audience to be active participants through ongoing channels of dialogue. The company provides a home for a multidisciplinary group of artists and partners with regional theatre and arts presenters in New York, nationally and internationally.

Since its founding in 2001, The Civilians has supported the creation of eleven original shows—*Canard, Canard, Goose?*, *The Ladies, Paris Commune, Gone Missing, Way to Go!, (I am) Nobody's Lunch, Shadow of Himself, This Beautiful City, In the Footprint: The Battle Over Atlantic Yards, Maple and Vine and Tales from My Parents' Divorce.* The Civilians' projects have been produced at numerous theatres in New York including The Public Theater and Vineyard Theatre; nationally at Center Theatre Group, A.R.T., La Jolla Playhouse, HBO's US Comedy Festival, Studio Theatre and Actors Theatre of Louisville among others. Works by the company have toured extensively to arts presenters and festivals with presentations in over 40 cities nationally and internationally. The Civilians made its UK debut with *Gone Missing* in 2004 at the Gate Theatre, and *(I Am) Nobody's Lunch* was a Fringe First Award winner at the 2006 Edinburgh Fringe leading to a London production at Soho Theatre.

In addition to the performances of *In the Footprint: The Battle Over Atlantic Yards*, the Annenberg Center invites audience members to participate in a super-sized collection of its signature INSIGHTS events before and after the show. The Annenberg Center and Penn Design are presenting an array of informative and engaging events surrounding *In the Footprint* that are FREE for all ticket holders. Discuss the polarizing themes from the work, especially as they relate to current-day Philadelphia, ask questions and engage with experts on the subject—including most notably, former **Mayor John Street** the developer behind the Northern Liberties boom, **Bart Blatstein**, the play's composer/lyricist and **Chestnut Hill native**, **Michael**

January 31 at 7 PM (Annenberg Center, Room #511): Public forum and discussion featuring community members, stakeholders and developers with ties right here in Philadelphia, moderated by journalist **Heshimu Jaramoji** and organized by **Harris Steinberg**, Executive Director, Penn Praxis and **Harris Sokoloff**, Director, Penn Project for Civic Engagement, both central figures in the Delaware Riverfront Planning Process. Notable panelists include former **Mayor John Street, Bart Blatstein**, the developer behind the Northern Liberties boom, **Alan Greenberger**, Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development, City of Philadelphia and **Chris Satullo**, WHYY.
